



A MESSAGE FROM OUR DIRECTING PASTOR

Dear Church Family,

This month I had the great opportunity to go to New Orleans for a youth ministry conference. I am attending the "Extravaganza" conference, where youth ministry leaders from around the ELCA church gather to learn from one another about best practices and new ideas. This year's conference also has the joy to host many excited leaders who will be bringing their high school-aged youth to New Orleans in just 7 short months for the National Youth Gathering. To say that the air is electric would be an understatement. Everyone is excited to be having the gathering again, after the last one three years ago, was cancelled due to the pandemic.

One of the reasons that people are excited is because it's been six years since thousands of Lutheran youths have gathered to deepen their faith in new, exciting and fun ways. Another reason is because of a word that has been coming back to me over and over again the last month. That word is renew. The youth gathering leaders have taken the opportunity over the last few years to renew what was needed about this gathering. They pivoted in some ways to ways that fit better with what the students needed. They have trust in what God called them into and trusted in the Holy Spirit to guide their decision-making process.

As I think about this national youth gathering, I think about how we can all glean from renewal in our lives. Renewal of word. Renewal of hearts, hand, and mind. Renewal of soul. Renewing means allowing yourself to feel hope, to be loved, to love others in a gracious flow of that comes from our triune God. Renewal is not just about finding new things or new ways of doing things, it's also about remembering, noticing, and seeing what is already around you.

When we think about renewal in our lives, we must also remember that sometimes we just have to look at things from a different perspective to see what is already there. When we think about renewal in our faith lives, it's important to remember that the Holy Spirit is already there, working in your life. God is already at work in your life. Jesus is at work in your life offering grace, comfort, and love. Sometimes this renewal is us just changing the way we look at things, knowing our God doesn't change.

In the bleakness of winter, it is easy to cuddle down to comfort. It's easy to stay where it's comfortable in life. Let us seek out God in our lives. The God that is already there, already waiting for us to change our perspective and gain renewal in our lives.



Hendrickson 30th Anniversary Recital Series At the end of last month's newsletter article, I mentioned we were planning to invite area organists to perform short recitals throughout the year in celebration of 30 years of praising God through music.

Response to my invitation was truly humbling. Some of the finest organists in our region have agreed to share their talents. The recitals will take place on Wednesdays from noon to 1 pm throughout 2024 in the Sanctuary and will be free and open to all. Proceeds from a freewill donation will go to support the Organ Renovation Fund.

February 21 – Alexander Meszler is an organist dedicated to interdisciplinary performance and research. He serves as College Organist and Assistant Professor of Music at Luther College.

April 17 – Andrew Beine is in his final semester at Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary in Winona. He is a multi-instrumentalist playing trumpet, guitar, and singing in addition to his outstanding organ skills.

June 19 – Noah Carlson grew up playing music in his hometown of Houston, Minnesota. Many at Central have heard Noah play as he has served as a substitute organist on several occasions. Noah is currently an organist at St. Barnabus Lutheran Church in Plymouth, MN.

July 17 – Sue Walby is Director of Music and Organist at First Presbyterian Church in La Crosse. She grew up in a small, rural Lutheran congregation where she had the opportunity to accompany singing for many groups. Sue holds a degree in piano performance/pedagogy from Lawrence University.

August 21 – Daniel Lewis is a graduate of Winona State University. He has worked as a church musician in Owatonna and Winona. Dan is currently organist for St. Martin's Lutheran Church in Winona.

September 18 – Sebastián Modarelli studied at the National Conservatory of Music in his native Buenos Aires, Argentina, earning his degree as salutatorian of his class. He currently serves as Music Director and Organist at the Co-Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist in Rochester.

October 16 – John Stender is the Director of Music at First Presbyterian Church in Rochester. He holds degrees in Organ and Sacred Music from Luther College and the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University.

November 20 – A. Eric Heukeshoven is a composer and multi-instrumentalist who currently serves as Director of Worship, Music & Central Lutheran in Winona.

December 18 – Scott Turkington will be familiar to all who have attended our Messiah Sing-In the past two years. Scott is an organist and choirmaster for the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in La Crosse.



Last night I folded a huge load of laundry.

Often, when doing household chores, I listen to the news, a podcast, music, maybe even an old tv show I love. This time, though, I resisted the urge to grab for my phone and folded in silence. I found this allowed me to reflect upon the generosity of so many. You see, I was folding cloth napkins, towels, rags, and washcloths from the LCC. I'd put off the task for so long that I had to fold nearly every single napkin we have. And, let me tell you, we have a lot of cloth napkins!

As I shook out the florals, checked patterns, and solid colored cloths, lining up the corners, and folding square after square after square, I wondered once again who shared this abundance with us. I know where some of our napkins came from—that dear woman, Connie Larson. [Thank you, Connie!] But, the rest? I still don't know the secret angel who left a basket of folded, homemade cloth napkins on the steps outside my office door years ago. The gift came at a time in which students were focusing even more on care of God's creation—timely, unexpected, and mysterious.

The stack of napkins placed carefully back in the basket sat precariously high before I started on the dish towels. I realized then that I'd purchased only four of the many towels we have. Two red towels came from Laura Loos (a member at Faith in Winona), after she brought dinner nine, or ten years ago, and noticed we needed a couple new towels. Large, cotton white towels came from Jeff Franko after we ran out of towels last year following our Donor Dinner. [I'd put off the laundry task then, too, to be honest.] Even many of our washcloths and rags were gifts from people when we remodeled our space to include the kitchen in 2016.

Yes, last night I folded a huge load of laundry, and the silent, repetitive task left me filled with such gratitude and awe. So many of you are folded into our story at the LCC, from gifts of cloth to dinners, prayer shawls and quilts, monetary gifts, spoken prayers, volunteering with mailings and other events, to serving on committees, the board, and so many other countless ways. Thank you, dear ones. And, the next time you fold laundry, remember the gift that you are to our students and wider community. Your love reaches far and wide, inspired by the one who clothes us with grace every day.


Central Lutheran Book Group

NICARAGUA

GET READY TO WELCOME JAZMINA AND JULIO!

Last summer WIN committed to sponsoring Jazmina Penado and Julio Maranda from Nicaragua. This couple is coming as part of the Parole Program available to people in Cuba, Haiti, Nicaragua, Venezuela, and Ukraine. They are preapproved and vetted in their home country before travelling to the U.S.. As part of this program they need to pay their airfare to travel to an entry point within the interior of the U.S. rather than a border town. This is intended to slow down the crisis at the border. A feature of this program is that they will be able to apply for a work permit within days of arriving, so they should not have to wait so long to be allowed to work. They will both have some knowledge of English and our culture, as they were exchange students to the U.S. when they were students thirty years ago. When we committed to sponsoring them we had no idea when they would be allowed to come. We were told it could be a month, or a year, or more. We now know they will be arriving on February 22nd!

If would like to help WIN welcome Jazmina and Julio and help get them set up in an apartment, please contact Judy Davis, Denise Bernatz, or Pastor Mike. Also, we are looking for a safe, reasonably priced one bedroom apartment for them. If you have a rental that's available, or coming available by March or April, or know of one we should check out, please let Judy, Denise, or Pastor Mike know. We ask for prayers for safe travels and a smooth transition for Jazmina and Julio.

Alex, Veronica, and Jeronimo are settling in and experiencing their first Minnesota winter. The whole family went sledding with new friends on the first "snow day" of the school year. Jeronimo is attending the Winona Middle School. Alex and Veronica go to English class 4 days a week for 2 hours a day. They are working with an attorney to apply for asylum status and their Work Authorization Document. They are very anxious to work, but the way the immigration system works they will realistically not be able to be employed for about 8 months. They would like odd jobs for donations to WIN as they are so grateful for the help we are giving them.


