

#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR DIRECTING PASTOR

Sisters and Brothers in Christ

Worshipping our Savior has been done in many different places and in many different ways over the centuries. Worshipping Jesus has been happening in Winona and Central for over 150 years. Now we are charged with ensuring there will be a place and a space to worship Jesus our Savior for the next 150 years and beyond.

So what will worship look like in the future? What sound or video or lighting will be needed in the years to come? What updates do we need to keep our gathering space viable for all that takes place in that space?

These are the questions I raised at the annual meeting as we set a vision for the future of Central. These questions were raised because of the work to be done in 2028 as we refurbish our pipe organ. During the time of restoration, we will need be outside the sanctuary for a few months. So I began to ask if that would be a good time to refurbish the sanctuary and update it for worship in the 21 st century.

First of all, I want to assure you worship will look and feel very similar to worship today. We will still be singing hymns and songs, we will still offer our praise and prayers to God. We will continue to gather around the Lord's Table and we will continue to be sent to proclaim the Good News of Jesus in word and deed.

Yet at the same time there will be changes in the way or manner in which we worship just as there has been since worshipping God began centuries ago. Consider the ways worship has changed in the past few years. When I arrived 5 years ago we were recording the service using old outdated equipment. It worked but did not produce the quality or project the image of a vibrant, forward thinking congregation. Since then we have upgraded the video and some sound equipment. Yet to produce the quality service we want to project, there are additional lighting and sound needs to make that happen.

In addition, there are a couple of things we could do to highlight the beautiful space we have, most importantly our beautiful stained glass windows. As best as anyone remembers it has been 30 years since the walls have been painted. The flooring is even older and contains asbestos. While the asbestos is contained and does not create a health concern, it is something we should take care of.


Not only is our sanctuary used for worship but has become a hub for community activities like organ concerts, Bach Society concerts, Beethoven Festival along with WSU, the Winona Symphony and Messiah sing-in. In updating the looks and environment Central can become a showcase for community gatherings. Each time those events happen, more people will be introduced to the beauty of our building and the welcoming place we call Central Lutheran.

This year there will be opportunities for you as members to offer your input and to give us your answers to the questions above. In hearing your voices and receiving your input we will be able to come up with the best plan as we move forward. When complete Central Lutheran will not only a central place within Winona for worship and community gatherings in the 21 st century but will be a space and a place to worship our Savior in the 22 nd century and beyond.

# A MESSAGE FROM OUR ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Brothers and Sisters in Christ-

On an abnormally sunny, Tuesday morning in February, here in Winona, I was reminded of a word that some of us, including myself, often misplace- joy. Joy has been the topic of conversation many of times in our culture. From joy at Christmas to Marie Kondo's way of organizing ("Does that item bring you JOY?"), Joy is all around us. A simple book search of joy will bring books by the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmund Tutu, Brene Brown, and my favorite title that popped up- "Life is hard, God is good, Let's dance!".

Wouldn't it be great if it were so easy? Yet, I wonder if Joy could be easier to have in a world marked by things like war, cancer and death if we chose an attitude of Joy in our day to day lives. To choose joy daily is not an easy thing to do, and I think it may be why some of us, included myself, misplace it. Continually having joy be at the center of everything can be a daunting task in the midst of a post-pandemic world. Yet, I see it, and as the days and months since life got back to "new normal" I see it more and more.

I see more families getting re-involved with church. I see excitement from the kids in Sunday school and in confirmation. They are having fun; adults are filled with joy. People are stepping up to serve and finding ways to work together. The book of Nehemiah recounts some of the rebuilding of the walls and return to Jerusalem after Babylonian exile. During all of this, the Israelites came together to hear the law of Moses, in which they began to weep. But, Nehemiah told them in 8:10 "The Joy of the Lord is our strength". Much like the Israelites had to rebuild, we do too, but we can do it with joy with strength from God.

I would be amiss if I didn't mention the heartbreaks that we experience amidst the joys. They are there, they are real, and there's no amount of "attitudes of joy" that will fix them and make it better. But finding strength and comfort in God will give us power to rise. Simply knowing that God is there gives us joy, which can strengthen us in times of need.

Having an attitude of joy is not just about the mindset in which we bring to our lives, but it's also about finding where we can find our eternal, everlasting joy that can pick us up when we are at our lowest. That joy is in the Lord. I pray that this month, we can continue to seek out all the ways in which God, the Holy Spirit, works through us to bring an attitude of joy.

Handbells Ring Anew

Last May, the Rochester Area Handbells gave an amazing performance in our sanctuary. At that event, an information session was held to gauge interest in bringing a handbell choir back to Central. Subsequent surveys and many conversations proved to me that the beautiful sound of the bells would eventually return.

Fast-forward to February 1, 2024, when a group of 16 excited ringers met at 6 pm for their first rehearsal. As the people introduced themselves, we learned that some of the members had years of experience while others had never picked up a bell until that day. The group is also multi-generational



 from high school students to members of AARP! And not all the ringers are members at Central.

The community handbell choir meets from 6 to 7 pm each Thursday in the sanctuary. Our hope is to share this beautiful music at worship and to assisted living communities in Winona. Watch for an announcement of the choir's first performance in April.

Recently one of our students preached at the LCC. He didn't grow up going to church and, in fact, shared with us that night in worship that he was raised as "a little agnostic." He always felt like there was something, though, something bigger. Something like God. Divine Presence. When he came to college, he decided he was going to try new things. One day, while getting coffee with friends, he noticed that the large shared space we have with the coffee shop held bookmarks and signs about the LCC. The bookmark he picked up said there was a free dinner and worship in this very space on Sundays, so he decided to come the following weekend.

That Sunday was a rare occasion in which I was not able to be at the LCC; I was in California for my mother-in-law's memorial. When someone asked if he'd be willing to share contact info so that "Pastor Corrine" could get in touch with him- "She'd really want to meet you!"-he felt a bit nervous. All he knew of pastors was that they were usually older men who hated gay people, but sometimes said they didn't to trick them.

Thankfully, this student risked showing up again and did share his info. After that, he kept coming back, every week. He was looking for a job, and when he noticed we were looking for a student office assistant, he jumped at the opportunity. We met weekly with another student for "confirmation," reading stories from Genesis together. He always had the best questions and insights. After Palm Sunday, he came to my office to ask about the Easter story. He'd never experienced a Palm Sunday before, nor a holy week. It was such a gift for me, too, to be able to walk through the stories anew, with fresh eyes and questions. At the end of last school year, he was ready to apply for the student minister position, too.

Which brings us to him preaching a couple weeks ago... in the sermon, he shared that he doesn't necessarily use the label Christian for himself, and most of his friends aren't Christian. But— the feeling he'd always wondered about— that sense of something bigger— he finally felt the trueness of it. "I felt the unconditional love of God here, and I keep feeling it every time I come. All the time now."

This generation may not be big into labels and adhering to a certain doctrine, or creed, but they are incredibly intentional with how they spend their time and with whom they spend their time. Though the student may not self-describe as Christian, he does live it out. And he felt safe and comfortable enough at the LCC to say that aloud. He knew he could be authentic and honest and not lose his community. He knows- and feels- that he is loved by God, unconditionally. What more could we ask for?

The morning was filled with sharing memories, laughter and prayer. It was a delight to have Pastor Kristen join the social. Those who had not met her before were especially pleased.






